Name of creator(s): Russian Orthodox Church

Administrative/Biographical History:

"The Diocese of Alaska is a diocese of the Orthodox Church in America. Its territory includes parishes, monasteries, and missions located in Alaska. The diocesan chancery is located in Anchorage. The Diocese was founded when Alaska was part of Russia and is one of the oldest in the United States. [...] As of 2013, the Diocese includes 89 parishes, which represents the highest concentration of Orthodox Church in America parishes among the states."

Alexander (Nemolovksy) was Bishop of the Alaska Vicariate of the North American Diocese (now known as the Diocese of Alaska) in 1914, as was Amphilochius (Vakulsky) in 1925.¹

According to the accession file, this collection was once owned by a woman (name unknown) of Indigenous and Russian descent from Sitka. She was "the daughter of a man Lindquist who published the Sitka Sentinel in the early 1900's. These papers were found among her belongings after her death" and given to her neighbor, Eva Manginelli.
