Administrative/Biographical History:

Thomas (Tom) Melvin Odale was born on May 8, 1883, in Arkansas. In 1900, Odale sailed from Seattle to Hope, Alaska, to join his older brother J.J. (John Jerry) Odale. In about 1905 Tom helped install hydraulic mining equipment on Crow Creek for the Nutter and Dawson Mining Company. The following year, he and Jack Clouse started a two-year journey through the Rainy Pass range. During the trek, Tom met Jim Ward with whom he later built and navigated boats in the Inlet. On these boats Odale carried mail, supplies, and passengers for the Alaska Railroad as it was under construction.

In 1910, Odale married Ada Holser. Ada travelled to Alaska on the S.S. Portland, upon which she was a passenger when it wrecked at Katalla on November 12, 1910. Holser, and 29 other passengers, were rescued and housed at the Katalla hotel until she was able to continue her journey to Tom. The beached S.S. Portland remained in Katalla until it was disassembled and sold as scrap for the first World War.

After marriage, the Odale family settled at Anchorage Point. Their daughter, Louise, was born December 1911 in Seward, where she was delivered by Dr. Joseph Romig. Five years later, the Odale family moved to Seldovia and from there, wintered in Beluga. From Beluga, the family moved to Anchorage where Tom continued to pilot boats and work for the Railroad. He was also an early member of the Elks Club, while Ada belonged to the Woman's Club. In 1924 the couple divorced, and Ada and Louise moved to California. Tom remained in Alaska.

Prior to WWII, Odale had a lodge on Tustumena Lake where hunting parties from around the world would stay. He later sold the lodge during the war, and went to work for the government piloting boats from Anchorage to Seattle and around the Inlet¹.

Around 1950, Odale left Alaska and relocated to California. He died on December 31, 1972, at the age of 89².

Scope and Content Description:

The collection consists of primarily black and white photographic prints of the Cook Inlet region taken by Tom Odale and others. Photographed regions include Homer, Kenai, Beluga, Sunrise, and Seldovia.

Arrangement: Original order maintained.

Separated Materials

Prior to 2024, item .34 was separated and added to the RARE VF – World War – 1939-1945. The original item could not be located at the time that this finding aid was written in 2024.

Notes

Items .162-173 are noted as missing in the 1991 paperwork and were not located in 2024. Items .34, .57, .63, .91, .98, .118, and .157 were not with collection at the time that this finding aid was written. It is unclear if these items are missing or placeholders for the anticipated addendum.

Numbers .71-78 were not assigned to any materials in the collection.

Items .45, .110-111, and .135 are restricted due to sensitive content
