.51 – [Gold mines and mining -- Alaska -- Seward Peninsula.] [Tailings and buildings on a snowy landscape]

.52 – Seal Hunters Returning. Bags on their backs are seal skins. [Five people walking single file, snowshoes and spears strapped on their backs]

.53 – Nome, Alaska. [Street scene, tents and buildings line dirt road, Pioneer Restaurant Bakery at midground] [Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.54 – Gold mines & mining -- Alaska -- Seward Peninsula. [Two miners with rocker boxes, tent and people in background]

.55 – Taken by Moonlight exposure 3 hours. Light on Steeple 1-1/2 Mile distant. [1900-1909. Nome, Alaska.] [Snowy view of community and buildings. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.56 – 368. Moon exposure 3-hour [1900-1909. Nome, Alaska] [Snowy buildings and tents. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.57 – In the ice. S. S. Victoria. [Upper deck of steamship, person climbing rigging]

.58 – [Indigenous people] -- Alaska -- Seward Peninsula [Cyanotype, four adults and infant]

.59 – [Indigenous people] -- Alaska. [Three people with a husky dog amongst tents and buildings]

.60 – Nome, Alaska. [Waterfront camp, lumber and tools nearby. Boats at distance. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.61 – Wales, Alaska. [Four children outside building, two riding a wooden tricycle. Inupiaq territory, Kinigin (Wales)]

.62 – Nome, Alaska. [Loaded barge or freighter, possibly being pulled along a rope system. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.63 – Early Beach Mining [Gold mines & mining -- Alaska -- Seward Peninsula. Miners digging at camp, boat at right]

.64 – Nome, Alaska [Group on beach, buildings and tents in background. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.65 – 06 Maona. Simmer 281 [Indigenous woman in seated pose wearing fur parka and mukluks]

.66 – Nome, Alaska [Old St. Joseph's Catholic Church. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.67 – Council Solomon River Railroad [Group standing on railroad tracks, locomotive at left. Railroad operated between 1903-1907]

.68 – Two tusks found near Deering Alaska in the Candle District [Group posed with tusks. Likely Inupiaq territory, Ipnatchiaq (Deering)]

.69 – Gold Mines & Mining – Alaska – Seward Peninsula. Winter scene. [Description from catalog cards, item missing]

.70 – [Indigenous people] -- Alaska -- Seward Peninsula [Adults and children near structure covered in animal skins]

.71 – Nome, Alaska. Unloading freight. [Cargo suspended over water near beachline. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

.72 – Nome, Alaska. [People on busy shoreline, tents and supplies. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓̓asuaq (Nome)]

- .73 – Nome, Alaska. Umiaks. [Indigenous group paddling boat near shoreline, community in background. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓nasuaq (Nome)]
- .74 – British Columbia. Taken on return trip to Skagway from Lake Bennet. [Building exterior]
- .75 – Rev. Cutter "Bear" [Sailing ship U.S.S. Revenue Cutter Bear]
- .76 – R.M. Hawley. "Bear" Rev. Cutter [Person holding camera, hill at distance]
- .77 – [Dredge on Nome beach, tents and supplies at distance. Inupiaq territory, Sit̓nasuaq (Nome)]
- .78 – Frack dredge on Beach. [Inupiaq territory, Sit̓nasuaq (Nome)]
- .79 – Sailing ships (Bear?) [People on deck, possibly the U.S.S. Revenue Cutter Bear]
- .80 – Dawson from across the river. Aug 29-05. [Dawson City, Yukon Territory]
- .81 – [Horses pulling loaded sled, followed two people with harnessed reindeer]
- .82 – East Cape Siberia. Most Easternly point of mainland in Asia. - Dobbs [View of cliffs from water]
- .83 – "Chamaso Island, island in Kotzebue Sound, standing by a pile of stone used as marker by Russians in surveying the coast etc on their first trip in the waters. Date unknown, but in the 1700's I think." [Foggy view of person on rocky hill on Chamisso Island]
- .84 – "Sinrock Mary" The Reindeer Queen owns over 500 Reindeer worth \$100, to \$125. [Crowd gathered around Mary and child in fur parkas]
- .85 – General View of St. Michels, Alaska. [Tinted postcard, bay of St. Michael's Alaska]
- .86 – On the Trail to Unalaska, Alaska. [Tinted postcard, scenic, sheep in foreground. Unanga territory, Iluulu (Unalaska)]
- .87 – 1415 - Taku Glacier, Taku Inlet, Alaska. Copyright 1907 by Case & Draper. [Tinted postcard, scenic of ship near Juneau. Tlingit territory]
- .88 – Fourth Ave. Anchorage, Alaska. WLB 101. [Street scene. Dena'ina territory, Dgheyaytnu (Anchorage)]
- .89 – [on back:] 11.24.1914. "Things are very much as usual. Times hard + money tight is the usual cry." [View of bay community]
- .90 – [Aerial view of a few buildings along pipeline on hillside]
- .91 – [Person on horseback and people on foot transport a piece of equipment along trail]
