Nothing was known about the person or people who assembled these albums when this Finding Aid was written.

Scope and Content Description:

The Laurence Tyler Collection consists of 212 photographs and 111 negatives. The photographs are black and white and are primarily of gold mining in Alaska and Alaska Natives. The gold mining photographs include images from the Klondike Gold Rush and Chilkoot Trail, mining in Nome and on the Seward Peninsula. Images of Alaska Natives are primarily of villages and people from the Bering Sea coast and southeast Alaska.
