
Sugt'stun Alphabet

Vowels and '

- a Agi like a in English "father"
- e Erneq an "uh" sound like English a in "about"
- i Imaq like i in English "ski", like English "speck" when next to a uvular like in akiq
- u Sugt'stun like u in English "blue", like English "stoke" when next to a uvular like in aluq
- aa, ii, & uu are pronounced longer than a, i, & u as in aipaa, iingalat, and uumatak
- '-un'gani/cama'i/ag'ut/Sugt'stun separates consonants or vowels that may read differently otherwise, doubles the pronunciation of a consonant, or marks specific uses of the vowel e

Terms

Labial

Sounds made with the lips

Apical

Sounds made with the tip of the tongue

Laminal

Sounds made with the sides of the tongue

Velar

Sounds made by touching the soft part of the roof of the mouth

Rounded Velar

Sounds made by touching the soft part of the roof of the mouth and rounding the lips

Uvular

Sounds made by touching the uvula or near it
